THE OPENING SENTENCE

Officiant: Send out your light and your truth, that they may lead me, and bring me to your holy hill and to your dwelling. *Psalm 43:3*

CONFESSION OF SIN & ABSOLUTION

Officiant: Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

All: **Most merciful God, we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.**

Officiant: Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. **Amen.**

33 Teach me, O Lord, the way of your statutes, * and I shall keep it to the end.

34 Give me understanding, and I shall keep your law; * I shall keep it with all my heart.

35 Make me go in the path of your commandments, * for that is my desire.

36 Incline my heart to your decrees * and not to unjust gain.

37 Turn my eyes from watching what is worthless; * give me life in your ways.

38 Fulfil your promise to your servant, * which you make to those who fear you.

A READING FROM ROMANS 13:8-14

Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. The commandments, “You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet”; and any other commandment, are summed up in this word, “Love your neighbor as yourself.” Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law.

Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; let us live honorably as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in debauchery

and licentiousness, not in quarreling and jealousy. Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

People: **Thanks be to God.**

But if you are not listened to, take one or two others along with you, so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses. If the member refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church; and if the offender refuses to listen even to the church, let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector. Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven. Again, truly I tell you, if two of you agree on earth about anything you ask, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them.”

THE BLESSING & DISMISSAL

Dear Fellow Parishioners:

We hope this letter finds you and your family safe and well during this pandemic. We continue to pray for the more than 180,000 Americans who have lost their lives to this horrible disease and for their families who continue on in grief. We are thankful that only a handful of our parishioners have contracted COVID-19, and no one in our parish has succumbed to it.

However, the disease has profoundly impacted our parish finances. We have lost approximately 35% of our revenue stream due to the thrift shop closure, loss of parish rentals, and the inability to hold fundraising events. When we wrote to you this past spring, several of you answered our call by paying pledges in advance, increasing the amount, or sending in the funds we need for specific items such as lawn care. We are eternally grateful for the outpouring of support you have provided. Your generosity has enabled us to pay our operating expenses thus far. Unfortunately, without a robust response to this appeal letter, we will not be able to meet our obligations in this final quarter of the year.

The Vestry, the Finance Committee, and the Diocese have worked diligently to keep our parish open and functioning. We have renegotiated contracts and services with Robison Oil, Verizon, and Pitney Bowes. We have applied for and received government loans. The Diocese lowered all parishes' assessments and waived two months of the Rector's pension contribution. As the government PPP funds have been exhausted, we have had to take the unfortunate step of laying off our parish administrator and our organist. To say we are badly limping toward this last quarter of the year is not an exaggeration. We need your help

and come to you now with this appeal for assistance in closing the year.

So, as your wardens, we request that you respond to this appeal as generously as possible. Again, we thank those of you who have already increased pledges, or taken on lawn care expenses, or paid pledges in advance. As Helen Keller once said, “Alone we can accomplish so little; together we can accomplish so much.” Let us all work together to support this appeal and keep St. John’s solvent.

With sincere appreciation of your help, we remain ever faithful in your commitment to our church.
